**COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

Basic Proficiency in Spanish. 3 credit hours. Practice and further development of essential listening, speaking, reading, and writing skills.

Admission to SPAN 122 is reserved exclusively for those who have taken the USC Spanish Phase 1 Placement Exam and received the score of S3 OR have successfully completed SPAN 109 and SPAN 110, OR have successfully completed SPAN 121. Please note that credit may be earned only for SPAN 109 and SPAN 110, or SPAN 111, or SPAN 121. SPAN 122 is offered each semester and in the summer.

**LEARNING OUTCOMES:** Students who successfully complete this course should be able to do the following:

1. *Communication*

- understand the main ideas and many supporting details of written and spoken communication in the present and past time frames on topics of personal interest such as friends, family and pets; pastimes; travel; home and university life; shopping; food; holiday and celebrations; etc.
- engage in oral and written exchanges with a focus on providing and obtaining basic information, expressing feelings and preferences, describing and narrating, giving directions, and exchanging opinions on topics of personal interest such those mentioned above.

2. *Cultures*

- understand cultural information and relationships between cultural perspectives, products, and practices, especially as they relate to the Hispanic countries featured in the text (i.e., Ecuador, Costa Rica, Spain, Chile).
- use appropriate cultural behavior in social and transactional situations (making travel arrangements, shopping, getting medical care, etc.)

3. *Connections*

- use the Spanish language to reinforce and learn new information in academic areas such as history, geography, art, anthropology, and literature.

4. *Comparisons*

- develop insights into their own language and culture through readings and classroom activities which deal with Spanish speakers in the students' community and abroad.

**5. Communities**

- be made aware of opportunities to practice and hear the Spanish language outside of the classroom in activities such as concerts, movies, lectures, exhibits, festivals, and conversational exchanges with Hispanics in the community.

**FINAL GRADE:**

**All students are required to pass each component of the Exit Exam in order to receive credit for SPAN 122.** The scoring on each section is Pass/Fail. Students are permitted to retake the failed section(s) once at the date and time of the final exam scheduled for the course. Upon passing all sections, students will receive a minimal passing grade of "D" for the course. Grades above the minimal passing grade of "D" will be determined in accordance with the course components listed below.

Please note that, aside from bonus points for the two compositions, no extra credit is offered in this course.

**BACK CREDIT:**

Students who have initially placed into SPAN 122 may receive four (4) hours of back credit for SPAN 121 if they earn an A, B+, or B in SPAN 122. Once the final grades for SPAN 122 have been recorded, students should see Mrs. Cronise in the Department of Languages, Literatures, and Cultures (Humanities Office Building, Room 815) to complete the appropriate form to receive back credit.

**CLASS POLICIES: Be sure to familiarize yourself with the following policies.**

**CELL PHONES AND ELECTRONIC DEVICES**

- **Please ensure that your cell phone, palm pilot, and all other electronic devices (earpieces, earphones, mp3 players, etc.) are turned off and put away before class begins.**
- Use of these items during a quiz or exam will result in a grade of **zero** for that evaluation.
- Use of these items at other times during class will negatively affect your class participation grade.
- Additionally, students who use these devices in class will be subject to disciplinary action. For the **first violation of this policy, the student will be given a verbal or written warning.** If there is a **second**

**violation of the policy, the student will be given a written warning with copies to the Academic Dean's office, the Division Chair, and the Dean of Students.** Any subsequent infractions will be reported to the Office of Student Judicial Programs with a request for resolution at that level. ### **ATTENDANCE:**

Regular class attendance is essential for successful completion of the course, since we will work actively in class on increasing your skills in Spanish. Please note the following definitions and policies.

#### **Definitions:**

- **Excused absences.** Excused absences are those documented absences due to illness, attendance at family weddings or funerals, or official representation of the university. In exceptional cases, absences due to other similar serious circumstances may be excused, at the discretion of your professor and the course coordinator. Upon returning from the absence, the student must provide the requested documentation: doctor's note, funeral program, coach's letter or similar official documents, as directed by the professor and course coordinator. Note that absences for illness must include the specific dates when the student is unable to attend class.
- **Unexcused absences.** Absences due to reasons other than those listed above and/or absences for which the student does **not** provide official documentation are considered unexcused. Examples: If you have a minor illness and miss class, but do not seek medical expertise and therefore cannot provide a medical note, the absence is considered unexcused. Vacation travel is an unexcused absence. Similarly, absences due to routine responsibilities of student organizations, jobs, house/vehicle maintenance are not excused.
- **Partial attendance = unexcused absence.** Each time you arrive more than 10 minutes or leave more than 10 minutes early will count as an unexcused absence.
- **Late arrival / early departure.** Your professor will keep a record of every time you arrive up to 10 minutes late to class or leave up to 10 minutes early. The following equivalencies will apply:
  - **3 late arrivals/early departures = 1 unexcused absence**
  - 6 late arrivals/early departures = 2 unexcused absences
  - 7 late arrivals/early departures = 3 unexcused absences
  - Each additional late arrival/early departure = an additional unexcused absence

#### **Policies for attendance:**

**A. Penalties** are given for excessive unexcused absences (including late arrival/early departure and partial attendance, as defined above):

- Up to 3 unexcused absences = No effect on final grade.
- 4 unexcused absences = Final course grade is reduced by one step. (A to B+, B+ to B, B to C+, C+ to C, D+ to D, and D to F)
- 5 unexcused absences = Final course grade is reduced by a whole letter. (A to B, B+ to C+, B to C, C+ to D+, C to D, D+ to F, and D to F)
- 6 (or more) unexcused absences = Final course grade is reduced by two whole letters (A to C; B+ to D+; B to D; C+ to F; C to F; D+ to F; D to F.)

**B. Students who have 6 or more excused absences (or a combined total of 8 or more excused/unexcused absences)** are urged to consult with the Dean's office. Students with extensive/numerous illnesses or other serious circumstances may be eligible to withdraw from all courses without penalties on their academic record.

**C. Passing** all sections of the Exit Exam results in a minimum grade of D, despite excessive absences. Other grade penalties listed above, however, will apply.

#### **EXAMS AND QUIZZES:**

- **There are NO makeup chapter tests or quizzes.**
- If you miss one exam due to a **documented, excused** you should make proper and timely contact with the professor to discuss possible arrangements.
- If you miss a quiz, you will receive a score of zero (0) for the missing evaluation.
- Excused absences include official representation of the University, illness, attendance at funerals or weddings of family members, and the like; **the student must provide the requested documentation (official letter, doctor's note, funeral program, etc.)** Please note that vacation travel does not count as an excused absence.
- **The Exit Exams (first take), if missed, may not be made up or rescheduled. Retests of the Exit exams may be made up only in documented cases of severe illness or death in the family. Please plan your end-of-semester and holiday travel accordingly.**
- **The use of any electronic device during an exam or quiz will result in a zero on that exam/quiz.**

#### **HOMEWORK AND WRITTEN ASSIGNMENTS:**

- All assignments must be completed by the designated due date. Those missed due to an excused absence may be accepted upon returning to class. All other assignments not completed in time will be assigned a zero (0). It is the student's responsibility to ascertain missed work to be graded.
- All homework and written assignments are to be done online as assigned or in blue or black ink. All textbook, workbook, and lab manual exercises must be done completely if you wish to receive full credit.

#### **COMPOSITIONS:**

- Compositions will be written in class. You are expected to complete the necessary preparatory materials (handouts) before class.

**PUNTES VIDEO:** If you are absent on the day when the *Puentes* video is shown in class, you may view it on the Puentes web site. Please note that information contained in the videos is routinely included on course exams.

#### **CLASSROOM BEHAVIOR:**

- All students are expected to come to class fully prepared to participate in all activities and to speak Spanish in class. Failure to come to class prepared can adversely affect your success and the success of your classmates since pair work and group interaction are necessary for successful development of your conversational skills in Spanish.
- **Please ensure that your cell phone and all electronic devices (earpieces, earphones, MP3 players) are turned off during class. Your phone and electronic devices should be put away during class.** A ringing or vibrating cell phone, listening to an MP3 player or text-messaging during class is disruptive and may negatively affect your class participation grade.
- **The use of any electronic device during an exam or quiz will result in a zero on that exam/quiz.**

**HONOR CODE:** You are expected to practice the highest possible standards of academic integrity. Any deviation from this expectation will result in a minimum academic penalty of failing the assignment/evaluation, and will result in additional disciplinary measures. This includes using another student's work; use of translation tools other than simple dictionaries; obtaining help from friends, family or tutors; using notes or phones during quizzes and tests; improper citation of sources; and any other form of academic misrepresentation. The workbook (also called SAM—Student Activities Manual) will give you a code so that you can access the Web site. If you don't purchase the Workbook, you will have to purchase the Cengage Web Site code online, on your own.
